Tri-State Disaster Response For Animals

County Animal Response Teams (CART) are now forming to serve all the counties in the tri-state area. If you wanted to help when Katrina struck, but couldn't travel that far or didn't know how to help, we need you! We want to be sure that if there is a local disaster, that the animals will be safe.

A **CART** will respond when activated by the county Emergency Manager (or other government official.) Our job will be to rescue and care for any animals that are affected by a local man-made or natural disaster or emergency.



Possible disasters include, but are not limited to: severe winter storms, extended power outage, tornados, floods, fires, chemical spills, disease outbreak, civil unrest, evacuations and terrorist acts.

The animals that could be affected include: dogs and cats (pets and strays), horses, livestock, exotic animals, and wildlife. Second Chance wildlife is available to take care of the wild animals; the CART will care for all other affected animals.

HOW CAN YOU HELP? First, please be sure you have plans and supplies ready for yourself and the animals in your care. Many disasters and emergencies happen suddenly. If you are not prepared in

advance, you will require the assistance of various agencies. It is likely that it will take a few days for these agencies to get in place and organized, which means you are on your own until that happens (this could take days.) It is likely that the agencies will be overloaded with calls for help, which will further delay the speed of assistance to some people. If you can care for yourself and your animals during the first several days after a disaster, this helps reduce the impact of a disaster on you, your animals and the community. All CART members must have their own plans and supplies in place for their family and animals.



JOIN US! There are many ways you can help the CART team in your county (or on a tri-state level.)

The national plan for future disasters is to require that all responders have an official identification from a recognized agency. This is to ensure that responders have at least the minimum standards of training and that certification can be verified.

We can help you get the training you need as well as the identification once the minimum training is achieved.

Responding to a disaster takes training:

- Prior to an incident so that volunteers can operate safely without needing extensive training and supervision during the disaster.
- Knowledge of the strengths and training level of volunteers can maximize their assistance during a disaster.
- Training on the care and record keeping of the animals so that reunions are maximized and all animals and volunteers are safe.
